Guest speaker: Mary B. Mason

- Retired art teacher most recently from Seneca Valley, now working in jewelry, sculpture, and enameling
- Lives Cranberry and works in Pittsburgh PA
- Metalsmithing for 17 years

- Utilizes a home studio space as well as a shared studio space in Appalachian Rock Shop off of Rt.19 N
- Recommended book: *The Complete Metalsmith* by Tim McCreight
- Knew since 1st grade that she wanted to be an artist
- Enameling she does in the home but other metalsmithing she does at the Rock Shop due to large equipment and large variety of tools that are nice to be shared
- Utilizes her paintings and experiences to influence her metal pieces and jewelry
- Metalsmithing kiln gets to about 1300-100 degrees @ 2-3 minutes, but you can also use a torch for enameling
- Enameling is glass on metal that goes way back to the 5th century
 - o Can be copper, silver, steel
 - Very fragile
- Upcycling bullets to make statement pieces in response to current events
 - o Bullets cut and polish well
 - Uses other unique materials like a meteorite, horse tooth, volcanic beads, buffalo nickel, etc.
- Her jewelry is currently available for purchase at the gift shop at the Hoyt
- Demo from 7:53-8:04pm
 - Recommends purchasing glass from Thompson Enamel in Kentucky and sheet of sterling silver from Rio Grand
